The Passover Plot Mark 14:10-16



1. The Human Plot (10-11)

- Judas comes from Judah, which means "praised" or "celebrated."
- His father was Simon Iscariot (Jn. 6:71; 13:26).
- Iscariot, from Hebrew Ish-Kerioth, meaning "man of Kerioth."
 - a small town in the tribe of Judah (Josh. 15:15).

Judas

- John 6:64 Jesus knew from the beginning who they were who did not believe, and who it was that would betray Him.
- · The treasurer
 - 1) Providing for the expenses of the disciples
 - 2) Giving to the poor and those in need

Judas

- Summer of 29 AD (John 6:70-71)
- Saturday night in April 30 AD (John 12:4, 6)
- Wednesday of the Passion Week in April 30 AD (Mark 14:1-2, 10-11)

Judas' Motive?

- Satan had put it in his heart (John 13:2, 27).
- 1) Fear of the authorities (John 11:57).
- 2) Injured pride (John 12:1-8).
- 3) Disappointed expectations
- 4) Frustrated ambitions

Judas' Motive?

- 5) Greed & covetousness.
 - John 12:6 he was a thief, and as he had the money box, he used to pilfer what was put into it.
 - Matt. 26:15 "What are you willing to give me to betray Him to you?" And they weighed out thirty pieces of silver to him.
 - Zech. 11:12-13; Ex. 21:32

||. The Divine Plot (12-16)

- · "On the first day of Unleavened Bread"
 - Passover one-day feast
 - The Feast of Unleavened Bread a 7-day feast
 - Technically, the first day of unleavened bread began at sunset on Thursday night.
 - Josephus and the rabbis both mentioned that
 Thursday was often called the first day of the feast.

II. The Divine Plot (12-16)

- "When the Passover lamb was being sacrificed."
 - Cf. Ex. 12:6 'You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of the same month, then the whole assembly of the congregation of Israel is to kill it at twilight

[literally, "between the evenings"].

– Two days (Thursday & Friday)

II. The Divine Plot (12-16)

- In Galilee, a day ran from sunset to sunset.
 - That meant Passover began at sunset Thursday night and lasted to sunset Friday night.
 - Their lambs were sacrificed on Thursday afternoon from 3-5 PM.
 - And then they ate the Passover meal after sunset on Thursday.
 - Ex. 12:8 'They shall eat the flesh that same night, roasted with fire, and they shall eat it with unleavened bread and bitter herbs.

||. The Divine Plot (12-16)

- In Judea, the day ran from sunrise to sunrise.
 - That meant Passover began at sunrise on Friday morning and ran to sunrise on Saturday morning.
 - Their lambs were sacrificed on Friday afternoon from 3-5 PM.
 - They ate the Passover meal after sunset on Friday.

Who is this man?

- The evidence points toward the home of John Mark – the author of this gospel.
 - Cf. Acts 1:13; 12:2 the other NT uses of "a large upper room" (15) referred to the home of Mary, the mother of John Mark.
 - It's possible the man was John Mark's father.
 - It's even been suggested that the man carrying the water jar was, in fact, John Mark.

Why the Secrecy?

- Two things are very clear in these most unusual directions from our Lord...
 - 1) He intentionally kept the identity of the owner of the house secret.
 - 2) He intentionally kept the location of the house secret.
- Why
 - Luke 22:6 [Judas] began seeking a good opportunity to betray Him to them apart from the crowd.

The Passover Plot Mark 14:10-16

Application...

- 1) God's sovereign purpose always trumps human evil.
- 2) The way Jesus orchestrated the Last Supper powerfully revealed our Lord's love for his own.
 - a) Jesus wanted to eat the Passover with his disciples.
 - Cf. Mark 3:31-34
 - b) Jesus wanted to equip his disciples for what lay ahead.
 - John 13-17
 - c) Jesus wanted to express his love for his own!
 - <u>John 13:1; 15:9-11</u>
