He came to His own, and those who were His own did not receive Him.

2. John 13-17 centers on the ministry of Jesus to those who accepted Him

John 1:12-13

But as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God, even to those who believe in His name,

who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God.

Theme of John 13:1-20

Jesus Christ, the King of Glory, demonstrated His limitless love for His own by humbling Himself to the form of a slave to serve the disciples as an example for them to follow in demonstrating their love for one another.


- 1. It was before the Feast of Passover, <u>Thursday</u> night

Luke 22:8-13


Luke 22:8-13 (continued)

Knowing His hour had come

The Humble Service - John 13:5-11

- 1. Jesus began to wash the disciples feet
- 2. Peter said, "Lord, do You my feet wash?"
- 3. Jesus answered, "What I do, you do not intuitively know now, but you will come to know later."

1 Peter 1:18-19

knowing that you were not redeemed with perishable things like silver or gold from your futile way of life inherited from your forefathers, but with precious blood, as of a lamb unblemished and spotless, the blood of Christ.

1 Peter 2:24

and He Himself bore our sins in His body on the cross, so that we might die to sin and live to righteousness; for by His wounds you were healed.

1 Peter 3:18

For Christ also died for sins once for all, the just for the unjust, so that He might bring us to God, having been put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit;

The Humble Service - John 13:5-11

- 1. Jesus began to wash the disciples feet
- 2. Peter said, "Lord, do You my feet wash?"
- 3. Jesus answered, "What I do, you do not intuitively know now, but you will come to know later."
- 4. Peter said, "Never (No No) shall You wash my feet."
- 5. Jesus answered, "Unless by means of my entire work of humiliation of which this feet-washing is only a part I cleanse you from your sins, you will have no saving relationship with Me."

The Humble Service - John 13:5-11

- 6. Peter said, "Lord, then wash all of me."
- 7. Jesus said, "He who is bathed is <u>completely clean</u> and needs only to wash his feet. But <u>Judas was</u> <u>excluded</u>.

Bathing is **JUSTIFICATION**

Foot-washing is **SANCTIFICATION**

For Judas: Foot-washing was TEMPORAL COMMON GRACE

The Teaching - John 13:12-20


- 1. Positively: Since I, the Lord and Teacher, washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. I gave you an example that you also should do AS (NOT WHAT) I did to you.
- 2. Negatively: A <u>slave</u> is not greater than his <u>master</u> nor the <u>sent</u> greater than the <u>sender</u>.
- 3. Since you know these things AND if you keep on doing these things, you will be happy.

The Teaching - John 13:12-20

- 4. Again, these things do not apply to Judas
- 5. Judas' treacherous betrayal, for which he is <u>responsible</u>, should not undermine the disciples' faith because it has been foretold by <u>Jesus</u> and by <u>Old Testament Scripture</u>.
- 6. Jesus affirms the <u>unity of authority</u> originating from the Father to the Son to the disciple.

1. Question: Should foot-washing be practiced as an ordinance within the Church?







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Carson: "Wise theologians and expositors have always been reluctant to raise to the level of universal rite something that appears only once in Scripture." (MacArthur: "The only other reference to foot-washing, 1 Timothy 5:10, is not in the context of a church rite, but of good deeds performed by individuals.")

1. Question: Should foot-washing be practiced as an ordinance within the Church?

Grudem: In his Systematic Theology, he cites 6 compelling reasons for lack of scriptural support for practicing foot-washing as an ordinance within the Church. #4 is provided here: "To make foot-washing an ordinance like baptism and the Lord's Supper reduces it to a symbol - and if it is a symbol, then Jesus' words command us only to perform a symbol, and the real force of Jesus' command (to act in humility and love) is lost."

2. Observation: Boice (from Stedman) notes the following parallels in Jesus humbling Himself in the foot-washing of the disciples (John 13) and Jesus humbling Himself in the incarnation (Philippians 2)

Implications:

- 1. We must continually remind ourselves that Jesus loves us (His own) who are in the world to the full extent of His love
- 2. We must <u>continually</u> love and serve one another since we know the command of Jesus
- 3. Those who do not <u>repent and believe</u> in Jesus Christ are excluded from the promises and blessings of God, as was Judas.
