Abrahamic Covenant

Summarized in three elements:

1.	Land	for His	possession 12:7	15:18-21	17:8
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- 2. Seed Deliverer 12:7 15:4 17:2-7 22:18 (Gal 3:8,14,16 refers to Christ)
- 3. Blessing for all the nations 12:3 15:1 17:7

Review

- A. God chose Abraham to receive His promises of the Abrahamic covenant.
- B. God told Abraham that Isaac, was His choice as heir to receive His covenant promises.
- C. Abraham accepted God's choice of Isaac to receive His covenant promises and sent His older brother, Ishmael away.
- D. God chose Jacob over his twin brother Esau, to be the heir of His covenant promises.
- E. Isaac resisted God's choice of Jacob by determining to bless Esau.

<u>Theme</u>: God is holy, loving, gracious, patient, willing to forgive and just. In our verses today, there are three responses to God's revealed character by men: obedience, rejection and worship.

Key Verse: Genesis 28:15 "Behold, I am with you and will keep you wherever you go, and will bring you back to this land; for I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you."

I. Isaac's Instructions-Evidence of Repentance

28:1-5

- 1. Isaac instructs Jacob to travel to Padden-aram to obtain a wife.
 - A. Jacob is not to marry a local woman from Canaan.
 - B. Jacob is to marry a woman from the country of his mother (Rebekah).
 - C. Jacob is to marry a daughter of Rebekah's brother (Laban)

- 2. Isaac submits his will to God's choice of who is to be the heir of his blessing.
 - a. Isaac prays for God to bless Jacob; to become fruitful, a mighty nation.
 - b. Isaac prays for God to bless Jacob; to possess the land given to Abraham
- 3. Isaac sends Jacob away from the Promised Land and to Laban's house.

Review

- A. Esau sold his birthright to Jacob for some stew and despised it.
- B. Esau married two Canaanite wives.
- C. Esau told others that after Isaac died, he would kill Jacob.

II. Esau's Efforts – Exercise of Unbelief

28:6-9

- 1. Esau observes Isaac's blessing of Jacob and his instructions for a wife.
- 2. Esau observes Jacob's obedience to the instructions of his parents.
- 3. Esau observes Isaac's displeasure with his two Canaanite wives.
- 4. Esau foolishly marries Ishmael's daughter in an effort to earn his father's blessing

Review

- A. Jacob exploited his brother's hunger and ignorance to obtain his birthright.
- B. Jacob deceived his father in order to receive his blessing intended for Esau.
- C. Jacob is preparing to run away from Esau's threat to kill him.

III. Jacob's Joy – Encouragement of New Faith

28:10-22

- 1. Jacob was forced to leave his home and family and was alone in the wilderness.
- 2. God affirms to Jacob that he will be the heir to His covenant promises to Isaac:
 - a. Land given to you and your descendants

- b. Seed many descendants, a great nation, the Seed, Jesus Christ
- c. Blessing in you and your family all families blessed
- 3. God encourages Jacob by adding to His covenant promises, these promises:
 - a. I will protect you everywhere you go.
 - b. I will bring you back from Haran to the Promised Land.
 - c. I will be present with you until I have fulfilled My promises.
- 4. Jacob responds to God's appearance to him, by worshiping Him.
 - a. He acknowledged God's presence and his fear of God.
 - b. He erected a memorial to remember God's appearance to him.
 - c. He entrusted himself to the Lord, acknowledging Him as his God.

IV. Application

- 1. Believers need to repent of their sin to be reconciled to God.
- 2. Those who reject God are lost in their sin and unable to please God in any way.
- 3. God will be present with those whom He has saved; to protect, to provide and to fulfill all He has promised.
- 4. Jesus Christ will save those who respond to the gospel in repentance and faith.
