
























Photo of the Mesha Stele (Moabite Stone)

The Moabite Stone was discovered in 1868 by a Germans missionary about 20 miles east of the Dead Sea. It is 4 feet high, two feet wide and 14 inches thick. There are 32 lines of Hebrew-like text. It mentions "Chemosh," "Omri...and his son," "Israel," "Yahweh" and the "House of David." It is now in the Louvre Museum in Paris.



Theme Statement


The LORD declares that certain judgment is coming for sin, especially the sin of pride, but He also offers deliverance from final judgment through the steadfast love of His coming Messiah King.





Alan MacRae"It is unfortunate that among Christians in general the terrible nature of the sin of pride is not sufficiently realized. We are apt to think of grosser sins as being worse, but in God's sight there is nothing comparable to the sin of pride. In God's sight the arrogance of the human heart -- exaltation of the human being as over against God -- is far worse than any of the sins of the flesh. Alas, how easy it is for us to become like the Pharisees, to gather our skirts around us and praise God that we are better than our neighbors. God will never bless such an attitude. The one thing He loves above all else is a humble and a contrite spirit. He wants us to realize that apart from the grace of God none of us deserve anything good at His hand."
