Definitions - Decrees of God

The eternal plans of God whereby, before the creation of the world, he determined to bring about everything that happens.

The doctrine that God is continually involved with all created things in such a way that he:

- 1. keeps them existing and maintaining the properties with which he created them;
- 2. cooperates with created things in every action, directing their distinctive properties to cause them to act as they do: and
- 3. directs them to fulfill his purposes.

The Heidelberg Catechism, Question 27:

What dost thou mean by the providence of God?

The almighty and everywhere present power of God; whereby, as It were by His hand, He upholds and governs heaven and earth, and all creatures; so that the herbs and grass, rain and drought, fruitful and barren years, meat and drink, health and sickness, riches and poverty, yea, and all things, come not by chance, but by His fatherly hand."

Providence may be defined as that continued exercise of the divine energy whereby the Creator preserves all His creatures, is operative in all that comes to pass in the world, and directs all things to their appointed end.

The providence of God means the continuing action of God in preserving his creation and guiding it toward his intended purposes.

God the great Creator of all things doth uphold, direct, dispose, and govern all creatures, actions, and things, from the greatest even to the least, by His most wise and holy providence, according to His infallible foreknowledge, and the free and immutable counsel of His own will, to the praise of the glory of His wisdom, power, justice, goodness, and mercy.

Providence and the Believer

Providence is in certain ways central to the conduct of the Christian life. It means that we are able to live in the assurance that God is present and active in our lives. We are in his care and can therefore face the future confidently, knowing that things are not happening merely by chance. We can pray, knowing that God hears and acts upon our prayers. We can face danger, knowing that he is not unaware and uninvolved.

A Right Perspective

With its doctrine of providence the Church took position against both, the Epicurean notion that the world is governed by chance, and the Stoic view that it is ruled by fate. From the very start theologians took the position that God preserves and governs the world.

A Right Perspective

Augustine led the way in the development of this doctrine. Over against the doctrines of fate and chance, he stressed the fact that all things are preserved and governed by the sovereign, wise, and beneficent will of God. He made no reservations in connection with the providence of God, but maintained the control of God over the good and the evil that is in the world alike.

General and Special Providence

Theologians generally distinguish between general and special providence, the former denoting God's control of the universe as a whole, and the latter, His care for each part of it in relation to the whole.

For you [the Father] granted him [the Christ] authority over all people [general providence] that he might give eternal life to all those you have given him [special providence].



3 Elements of Providence

- 1. Preservation
- 2. Concurrence
- 3. Government



3 Elements of Providence

But while we distinguish three elements in providence, we should remember that these three are never separated in the work of God. While preservation has reference to the being, concurrence to the activity, and government to the guidance of all things, this should never be understood in an exclusive sense. In preservation there is also an element of government, in government an element of concurrence, and in concurrence an element of preservation.

God keeps all created things existing and maintaining the properties with which he created them.

Preservation may be defined as that continuous work of God by which He maintains the things which He created, together with the properties and powers with which He endowed them.

Concurrence may be defined as the cooperation of the divine power with all subordinate powers, according to the pre-established laws of their operation, causing them to act and to act precisely as they do.

Divine-human concurrence. You are making free moral choices while God is perfectly accomplishing exactly what He intends.

2 Implications of Concurrence

- 1. That the powers of nature do not work by themselves, that is, simply by their own inherent power, but that God is immediately operative in every act of the creature. This must be maintained in opposition to the deistic position.
- 2. That second causes are real, and not to be regarded simply as the operative power of God. It is only on condition that second causes are real, that we can properly speak of a concurrence or cooperation of the First Cause with secondary causes.

Government

God has a purpose in all that he does in the world and he providentially governs or directs all things in order that they accomplish his purposes. Grudem

Government means that God is actively engaged in achieving his purposes in his creation and that sin cannot thwart those purposes.

God's Government Affirms 2 Things

- 1. The absolute sovereign lordship of God over creation
- 2. We are all dependent not autonomous

now, will not God bring about justice for His elect who cry to Him day and night, and will He delay long over them? "I tell you that He will bring about justice for them quickly. However, when the Son of Man comes, will He find faith on the earth?"



The Exposure and Punishment of the Wicked

Psalm 7:12-13

If a man does not repent, He will sharpen His sword; He has bent His bow and made it ready. He has also prepared for Himself deadly weapons; He makes His arrows fiery shafts.

Psalm 11:6

Upon the wicked He will rain snares; Fire and brimstone and burning wind will be the portion of their cup.



Pelagians, Semi-Pelagians, and Arminians raise a serious objection to this doctrine of providence. They maintain that a previous concurrence, which is not merely general but predetermines man to specific actions, makes God the responsible author of sin. Reformed theologians are well aware of the difficulty that presents itself here, but do not feel free to circumvent it by denying God's absolute control over the free actions of His moral creatures, since this is clearly taught in Scripture.



Let no one say when he is tempted, "I am being tempted by God"; for God cannot be tempted by evil, and He Himself does not tempt anyone. But each one is tempted when he is carried away and enticed by his own lust.

We can begin by looking at several passages that affirm that God did, indeed, cause evil events to come about and evil deeds to be done. But we must remember that in all these passages it is very clear that Scripture nowhere shows God as directly doing anything evil but rather as bringing about evil deeds through the willing actions of moral creatures. Moreover, Scripture never blames God for evil or shows God as taking pleasure in evil and Scripture never excuses human beings for the wrong they do.



But if the sinful actions of humans are not caused by God, what do we mean when we say that they are within his governing activity? There are several ways in which God can and does relate to sin. He can:

- Prevent it
- Permit it
- Direct it
- Limit it



The Problem of Evil God Can Prevent Sin

Genesis 20:6

Then God said to him in the dream, "Yes, I know that in the integrity of your heart you have done this, and I also kept you from sinning against Me; therefore I did not let you touch her.

Psalm 19:13

Also keep back Your servant from presumptuous sins; Let them not rule over me; Then I will be blameless, And I shall be acquitted of great transgression.



God Does Not Always Prevent Sin

Acts 14:16

In the generations gone by He permitted all the nations to go their own ways;

Romans 1:24

Therefore God gave them over in the lusts of their hearts to impurity, so that their bodies would be dishonored among them.



God Does Not Always Prevent Sin

Psalm 81:12–13

So I gave them over to the stubbornness of their heart, To walk in their own devices. Oh that My people would listen to Me, That Israel would walk in My ways!



God Can Direct Sin

Genesis 37:21-22

But Reuben heard this and rescued him out of their hands and said, "Let us not take his life." Reuben further said to them, "Shed no blood. Throw him into this pit that is in the wilderness, but do not lay hands on him"—that he might rescue him out of their hands, to restore him to his father.

Genesis 45:8

Now, therefore, it was not you who sent me here, but God; and He has made me a father to Pharaoh and lord of all his household and ruler over all the land of Egypt.



God Can Direct Sin

Acts 2:36

Therefore let all the house of Israel know for certain that God has made Him both Lord and Christ—this Jesus whom you crucified.

Romans 11:25

For I do not want you, brethren, to be uninformed of this mystery—so that you will not be wise in your own estimation—that a partial hardening has happened to Israel until the fullness of the Gentiles has come in;



God Can Limit Sin

Job 1:12

Then the Lord said to Satan, "Behold, all that he has is in your power, only do not put forth your hand on him." So Satan departed from the presence of the Lord.

Job 2:6

So the Lord said to Satan, "Behold, he is in your power, only spare his life."



The Problem of Evil God Can Limit Sin

1 Corinthians 10:13

No temptation has overtaken you but such as is common to man; and God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted beyond what you are able, but with the temptation will provide the way of escape also, so that you will be able to endure it.



God's Governing Authority - Conclusions

- God's governing authority is universal. Rom 8:28; Isa 44-45
- God's providence does not extend merely to His own people
- God is good in His government
- God is personally concerned about those who are His
- Our activity and God's activity are not mutually exclusive
- God is sovereign in His government



God's Governing Authority - Conclusions

The Heidelberg Catechism, Question 28:

What advantage is it to us to know that God has created, and by His providence doth still uphold all things?

That we may be patient in adversity; thankful in prosperity; and that in all things, which may hereafter befall us, we place our firm trust in our faithful God and Father, that nothing shall separate us from His love; since all creatures are so in His hand, that without His will they cannot so much as move.

Concluding Thoughts

The Christian and Suffering

Suffering complicates and tests our surrender to God. As Psalm 34:19 says, "Many are the afflictions of the righteous," so Thomas Brooks (1608-1680) observed, "God, who is infinite in wisdom and matchless in goodness, hath ordered troubles, yea, many troubles to come trooping in upon us on every side." Sorrows create a grave dilemma for the Christian, for he does not want to deny either the sovereignty or the goodness of God. If we desire to walk humbly with our God (Mic.6:8), then, as Owen said, we must fall down before God and acknowledge that He has the sovereign right to do as He pleases...



Concluding Thoughts

The Christian and Suffering

...We must believe that He acts with wisdom, and righteousness, goodness, love, and mercy in all that He does, even though it may be difficult to see that in the confusing vicissitudes, dizzying changes, and deep distresses of life.

The Christian and Suffering

Hopkins warned that if human reason attempts to track the logic of divine providence, it will find itself in "entangled mazes and labyrinths," just as if we try to search out God's eternal decree of election. He wrote, "We may sooner tire reason in such a pursuit than satisfy it." It is far better to bow in worship and exclaim with Paul, "O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are his judgments, and his ways past finding out! (Rom. 11:33)

Principles to Remember:

- God is in control of the universe.
- God is working out His perfect purposes, also in my life.
- God is not my servant.
- God's ways are far more mysterious and wonderful than I can understand.
- God is always good; I can always trust Him.
- God's timetable is not the same as mine.
- God is far more interested in what I become than what I do.
