








The Life of David

2 Samuel 14
Absalom's Estrangement from David









Introduction

Theme: Just as God declared would happen, calamity continues to unfold in David's family amid sins and their consequences. Absalom's estrangement from David promotes bitterness that will later escalate to full blown ungodly rebellion.

2 Samuel 12:10–11 ¹⁰'Now therefore, the sword shall never depart from your house, because you have despised Me and have taken the wife of Uriah the Hittite to be your wife.' ¹¹"Thus says the LORD, 'Behold, I will raise up evil against you from your own household; I will even take your wives before your eyes and give *them* to your companion, and he will lie with your wives in broad daylight.

Her present problem: The rest of the family seeks justice by wanting to kill my

Her undesired outcome: This would end the family line and my husband's name

 - Awkwardly, the woman returns to her fictitious story (vv15-17)

- He perceives the need, plans the strategy, and recruits a woman from Tekoa (vv1-3)
- The woman presents her fictitious story to David (vv4-17)
- David unmasks the fictitious story and its source (vv18-20)
- David instructs Joab to bring Absalom back to Jerusalem (vv21-24)
 - However, he's not permitted to see the king (v24)

Absalom is highly praised among the people (vv25-27)

- All Israel consider him (v25)
 - Handsome
 - Highly praised
 - Without defect
- He had lots of hair (v26)
- He had 3 sons and a beautiful daughter (v27)

Absalom seeks to be reconciled to David (vv28-33)

- After 2 years in Jerusalem without seeing David, he asks Joab repeatedly to help (vv28-29)
- After Absalom sets Joab's barley field on fire, Joab finally says ok (vv30-32)
- Joab brings Absalom before David where David kisses and embraces him (v33)

Closing Observations

- Remember the big picture of what God said would happen
 - Theme: Just as God declared would happen, calamity continues to unfold in David's family amid sins and their consequences. Absalom's estrangement from David promotes bitterness that will later escalate to full blown ungodly rebellion.
- You can see David's struggle with moral authority based on his own sin
- Sin and its consequences really make life complicated
- Unresolved conflict with no communication easily promotes bitterness
- How quickly and easily the heart of man falls away from the Lord in disobedience
