

- Dynamic I Growing hostility from the Jewish leadership
 - 2 Groups of Jewish leaders

 - Sadducees / Chief Priests

• Pharisees - "the Jews", Pharisees, rulers, scribes, and lawyers

• Dynamic 2 - The crowds debating whether they would accept Jesus or reject Him • In 7:12–13–12 There was much grumbling among the crowds concerning Him; some were saying, "He is a good man"; others were saying, "No, on the contrary, He leads the people astray." I 3 Yet no one was speaking openly of Him for fear of the lews.



Confronting Unbelief (14-36)


A. Jesus casts out a mute demon (14) B. The crowd's controversy (15-16, 27-28)

- Response I Outright Rejection (15)
- Response 2 Those who wanted to see more signs (16)
 - Jesus will address in vs. 29-36
- Response 3 Misplaced esteem (27-28)
 - by a person hearing and obeying the Word of God.
 - standing before God.

• Jesus's defense (17-26): their reasoning was non-sensical

• Spiritual blessing is not based on external things like physical or familial or some other external connection to Jesus, but rather true spiritual blessing is evidenced

• A person's obedience to the word is an accurate barometer of their spiritual



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
A. Jesus's challenge to those who wanted more signs (29-36)

- Jesus's assessment (29a) Wicked
- The sign of Jonah (29b-30)
 - repentance. (Best fit)
- - people who rejected the greater messenger, Jesus.
- The real problem spiritual blindness (33-36)
 - General principle (33) you don't hide a light
 - Jesus's point He wasn't withholding the truth from them in any way
 - Metaphor of the eye (34-36)
 - Warning against self-deception (35)

• Option 2 - a reference to Jesus's resurrection as the ultimate confirming miracle • Condemnation of the Jewish people by the Queen of Sheba and Ninevites (31-32) • Their responses to the limited message they received are an open rebuke to the Jewish
