Innocent and Condemned

4. Teachings From the Passage

A. Jesus' treatment in the trial was a fulfillment of the Old Testament Prophecies

1. He would be betrayed (Psalm 41:9; Zechariah 11:12-13)
2. He would be falsely accused (Psalm 35:11)
3. He would be silent before his accusers (Isaiah 53:7)
4. He would be spat upon and struck (Isaiah 50:6)
5. He would be hated without cause (Psalm 35:19; 69:4)

- E. Jesus' treatment and response in his trial, lays down a pattern for his followers

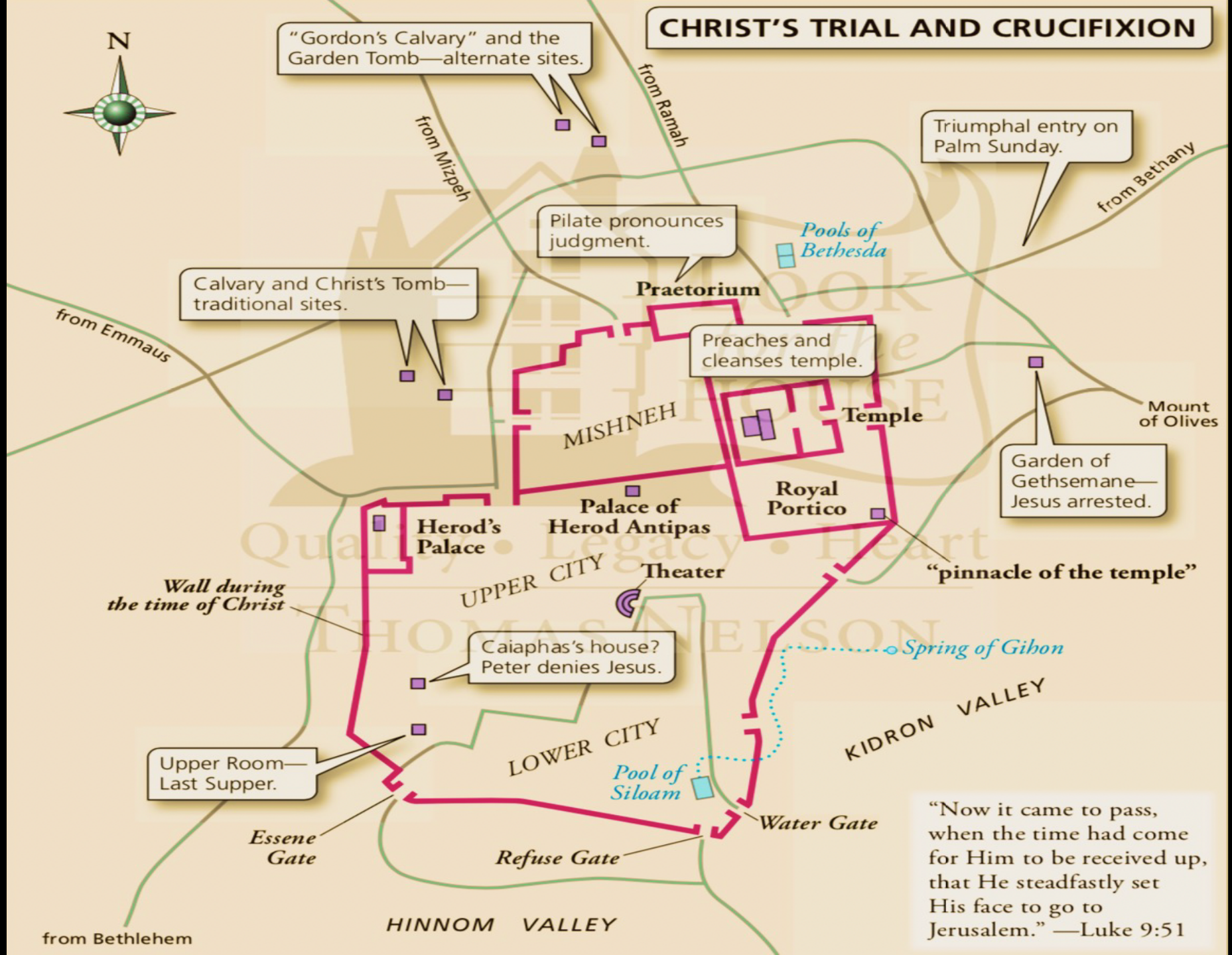

Herod the Great

37—4 BC

- King of Judea, Galilee, Iturea, and Traconitis
- Built Caesarea, the temple, Masada, and the Herodion
- Killed the babies of Bethlehem



Herod Philip II

4 BC—AD 34

- Tetrarch of Iturea and Traconitis
- Built Caesarea Philippi



Archelaus

4 BC—AD 6

- Governor of Judea, Idumea, and Samaria
- Reason Joseph and Mary settled in Nazareth (Matt. 2:19–23)
- Deposed by Romans



Herod Antipas

4 BC—AD 39

- Tetrarch of Galilee and Perea
- Built the City of Tiberias
- Married his brother's wife
- Put John the Baptist to death
- Sent Jesus back to Pilate (Luke 23:5–12)

Aristobulus



Herod Agrippa I

AD 37—44

- King of Judea
- Killed James the brother of John and imprisoned Peter (Acts 12:1–19a)
- Struck down by God at Caesarea (Acts 12:19b–24)

Herod Agrippa II

AD 44—70

- King of Judea
- Heard Paul's defense at Caesarea (Acts 25:13–26:32)
- Sided with Rome in the Jewish Revolt
