Mark 5:19–20 ¹⁹...He said to him, "Go home to your people and report to them what great things the Lord has done for you, and how He had mercy on you." ²⁰And he went away and began to proclaim in Decapolis what great things Jesus had done for him; and everyone was amazed. them those who were lame, crippled, blind, mute, and many others, and they laid them down at His feet; and He healed them. ³¹So the crowd marveled as they saw the mute speaking, the crippled restored, and the lame walking, and the blind seeing; and they glorified the God of Israel.

- He did many miracles among the Gentiles, and they glorified the God of Israel (Matt 15:30-31)

Matthew 15:30–31 ³⁰And large crowds came to Him, bringing with them *those who were* lame, crippled, blind, mute, and many others, and they laid them down at His feet; and He healed them. ³¹So the crowd marveled as they saw the mute speaking, the crippled restored, and the lame walking, and the blind seeing; and they glorified the God of Israel.

- Jesus returns to the Gentile region of the Decapolis (v31)
- He did many miracles among the Gentiles, and they glorified the God of Israel (Matt 15:30-31)
- Jesus heals a deaf and mute Gentile (vv32-35)
 - Friends bring the man and ask Jesus to heal him (v32)
 - Jesus takes him away from the crowd, communicates compassion and empathy, and heals him completely (vv33-35)
 - Jesus tells the people not to tell others what has happened...but they do it anyway (vv36-37)

Reflections

- Jesus showed a tremendous heart of concern and compassion in how he treated, healed, and shared the gospel
 - To other people groups (e.g., Gentiles)
 - **■** To individual people
 - To the handicapped
- The church and every believer should emulate our Lord in loving and reaching others, including those who are not like us
- You are never lost in the crowd when it comes to Jesus seeing you and knowing your needs!

- Jesus compassionately perceives the need of the crowd of people who have been with Him for 3 days (vv1-3)
- The disciples know of no available provisions, except for 7 loaves and a few small fish (vv4-5)
- Jesus performs a miracle in feeding the people from these small provisions (vv6-7)
- The people were satisfied, with an abundance of leftovers (vv8-9)



- Jesus says no other sign will be given except the sign of Jonah the prophet, and then He leaves (vv12-13)


Reflections

- Jesus will one day permanently leave those who do not believe in Him

- Enroute to Bethsaida, Jesus warns the disciples about the dangers of negative spiritual influences (vv14-15)
 - of the Pharisees dead, superficial, traditional religion with a flawed view of Scripture, God, sin, and salvation
 - of Herod secular worldliness, with occasional religious engagement but truly only caring about worldly things
 - of the Sadducees liberal, anti-supernatural religion, holding that God doesn't intervene in the natural world He created, and denying the miracles of the Bible

- Enroute to Bethsaida, Jesus warns the disciples about the dangers of negative spiritual influences (vv14-15)
- Jesus warns them about the danger of spiritual dullness (vv16-18a)
- Jesus warns them about the danger of weak faith (vv18b-21)

Reflections

- Beware of the dangers of today's false religion and secular influences
- You will not truly hear and understand biblical truth if your mind and heart are consumed with earthly matters


Colossians 3:2 ²Set your mind on the things above, not on the things that are on earth.
