Seeing and Savoring the Miracle at the Red Sea
Exodus 14:21-31

Introduction: The lifting of eyes motif or pattern in Genesis and Exodus.

- Lot and Abrabam (Gen. 13:10; 13:14)
- Abrabam and Sarah (Gen. 18:2)
- 2 angels and the preincarnate Christ appear to Abraham (he lifts his eyes and sees them) and Sarah to tell her she will conceive and be pregnant with Isaac.
- Abraham and Isaac (Gen. 22:13)
- Just as Abraham was about to sacrifice Isaac he lifted his eyes and saw a ram that then acted as a substitute.
- Isaac and Rebekah (Gen. 24:63-63)
- Both of them are said to have lifted their eyes when they saw one another for the first time
- The AC covenant would continue through them.
- Jacob (Gen. 31:10, 12)
- God appears to Jacob in a dream (he lifts his eyes) and God tells him to leave Laban and head back to Canaan
- Jacob and Esau (Gen. 33:1, 5)
- After several years of turmoil, birthrights and blessings exchanged and stolen, they reunite-on good terms. And when they first see each other they both lift up their eyes.
- Joseph and his brothers (Gen. 37:25)
- The brothers see a caravan of people coming and then sell him to the Ishmaelites and Joseph is taken to Egypt.
- Israelites and the Egyptians at the Red Sea (Exod. 14:10)
- Their Israelites lift their eyes and they see the Egyptians closing in on them.
- This is the first time this expression is used of an entire nation. So why is it used here?
- The greatest miracle, the greatest act of redemption, the greatest display of salvation in all of the OT Scripture happens at the parting of the Red Sea.

Sermon Theme: The Israelites lift their eyes and see God make His name and power known at the Red Sea in three profound ways: miraculously parting the Red Sea, utterly destroying the Egyptian army, and graciously saving His people.
