# Psalm 119 Observations



It is an <u>acrostic</u> poem



- It extols the word of God
- It centers on the deity of the almighty God
- It depicts duress and oppression faced by the psalmist

## Psalm 119:25-32



- A progression from desperation to restoration
- A contrast between two "ways"
- A marked difference between the clingings of the psalmist

## Psalm 119:25-32 ----



#### or. What is his condition?

25 My soul cleaves to the dust; Revive me according to Your word.

Contrast: His depleted vitality compared to a revived soul

#### 2. What is his confession?

26 "I have told of my ways, and You have answered me; Teach me Your statutes."

## 3. What is his concern?

27 "Make me understand the way of Your precepts, So I will meditate on Your wonders."

Contrast: My ways vs. God's ways
