

A. Fruitful Hearers - Mark 4

- The good news (1 Cor. 15:3ff; 2 Cor. 5:18–21)
 - is the work of God's grace
 - apart from any self-righteous effort
 - Ephesians 2:8–9

1. The parable of the soils (Mark 4:3–20)

- Focuses on the recipients of the gospel
 - those who would reject the message
 - those who would genuinely embrace it
 - Mark 4:20

2. By contrast, the subsequent parables (in vv. 21–32)

- Highlight the responsibility
 - of the faithful hearer as an evangelist
 - (cf. Rom. 1:13; Col. 1:3–6)
- Jesus expanded on that theme.
 - These are not disconnected stories
 - These are interrelated illustrations carefully arranged by Jesus to make a divine truth clear (v. 13)

3. Fruitful Hearers Witness Obediently (4:21–23)

- Those who have received the light of the gospel
 - are not to conceal it
 - they are to let is shine for others to see

4. Fruitful Hearers Work Expectantly (4:24–25)

- Jesus highlighted
 - the importance of serious dedication to the task
 - because of the promise of eternal reward for their faithfulness

5. Fruitful Hearers Wait Dependently (4:26–29) Today's Passage

- The farmer
 - not the power behind the regeneration of the seed
- The evangelist
 - not the power behind the regeneration of souls

6. Fruitful Hearers Walk Confidently (4:30–34)

- The kingdom of heaven
 - at that moment was tiny
 - like a mustard seed
- It would grow
 - to encompass the entire world
 - for generation after generation

B. Fruitful Hearers Wait Dependently Mark 4:26-29

- Believers are called
 - to witness obediently and work expectantly,
 - but they cannot produce life.
- Only God can give spiritual life
 - (cf. John 3:3–8; 2 Cor. 4:5–7)
- It is a parable comparing the kingdom of God to the mystery of a growing seed

1. The Primary Duty of the Farmer (26-27a)


- The kingdom of God = the sphere of salvation
- A man (sower) = evangelist ... you and me in this context
- Seed = message of the gospel
- The soil = hearers
- The evangelist (represented by the sower)
 - distributes the message of the gospel (the seed).
 - after he finishes sowing the seed, he goes to bed at night and sleeps

2. The Mysterious Growth of the Seed (27-28)

- a. We can't fully understand how it grows (27b)
 - The farmer
 - cannot cause the seed to sprout
 - or new life to form
 - or even fully understand how it comes to life

2. The Mysterious Growth of the Seed (27-28) continued

- b. We can't make it grow (28a).
 - The sower is not involved in the process (John 3:8; 1 Tim. 3:16)
 - This is the work of the Holy Spirit (John 3:5–8; John 6:37–44; Rom. 1:16; 1 Thess. 1:5; 1 Peter 1:23)
 - Regeneration is only by the Spirit of God (cf. Eph. 2:1–4;
 Titus 3:5)
 - Though believers are all called to faithfully proclaim the message, they can take no credit when unbelievers respond in repentant faith (cf. 1 Cor. 3:6–7)
 - **By itself** (αὐτοματη [automatē]). Automatically Acts 12:10

2. The Mysterious Growth of the Seed (27-28) continued

- c. We can't always see it grow (28b)
 - The point of this parable is
 - in the same way that the farmer is not the power behind the regeneration of the seed,
 - so also the evangelist is not the power behind the regeneration of souls.
 - (1 Cor. 3:6). (cf. Rom. 10:13–17)



2. The Mysterious Growth of the Seed (27-28) continued

first the blade, then the head, then the mature grain in the head

3. The Absolute Certainty of the Harvest (29)

- Even though the sower did not cause the growth of the grain
 - he still rejoices in the harvest (cf. 2 Tim. 2:6)
 - whenever the fruit yields itself or permits
- Puts in (ἀποστελλει [apostellei])
 - the word for apostle comes from this verb
 - see John 4:38

When the crop permits, he immediately puts in the sickle, because the harvest has come



C. The Implications of the Parable

- 1. The power of God is in the seed!
 - The seed of the gospel (Rom. 1:16-17; 1 Cor. 1:18)
 - The seed of the Word of God (1 Th. 2:13; 2 Tim. 3:15)
- 2. God alone is sovereign in salvation—*He* causes the seed to grow.
- 3. Jesus still expects every Christian to sow the seed.
- 4. Be patient with God to use the Word you've sown.
- 5. Our sowing ensures the eventual harvest.
- 6. If the seed has been sown in your heart, Jesus commands you to repent of your sin and believe the gospel (Mk. 1:14-15).

Conclusion

- The present age is a time for missions and testimony to the salvation offered in the Word of God.
- The message will be variously received, but many will prove good soil for the divine seed and will bring forth fruit by the power of God.
- We can effectively share the gospel with confidence.
