

From Corruption to Covenant – Genesis 6-8

Theme: The story of the flood underscores the power of obedience, the seriousness of sin, and the hope of redemption through a covenant.

I. The State of Man (6:1-7)

- 1) <u>Sethite Line View</u>: This interpretation sees the "sons of God" as descendants of Seth, the godly lineage, and the "daughters of men" as descendants of Cain, the ungodly lineage.
- 2) Royal or Tyrant View: Some scholars propose the "sons of God" were ancient kings or rulers who claimed divine status and took women by force.
- 3) <u>Fallen Angels View</u>: It suggests the "sons of God" fallen angelic beings (demons) who took human wives resulting in the birth of Nephilim, described as "mighty men of old."

They did not do evil through mere carelessness, as those that walk at all adventures, not heeding what they do; but they did evil deliberately and designedly, contriving how to do mischief. It was bad indeed; for it was only evil, continually evil, and every imagination was so. There was no good to be found among them, no, not at any time: the stream of sin was full, and strong, and constant; and God saw it.

What We Learn About Man:

In verse 5 we come to the first major description of the doctrine of human depravity.

II. The Heart of God (6:8-22)

Hebrews 11:7

By faith Noah, being warned by God about things not yet seen, in reverence prepared an ark for the salvation of his household, by which he condemned the world, and became an heir of the righteousness which is according to faith



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What We Learn About Man:

Obedience to God's Word is an act of worship and it demonstrates genuine faith.

Romans 12:1

Therefore I urge you, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship.

What We Learn About God:

God desires to have a relationship with His creation and not just rescuing them.

Psalm 103:10-14

¹⁰ He has not dealt with us according to our sins, Nor rewarded us according to our iniquities. 11 For as high as the heavens are above the earth, So great is His lovingkindness toward those who fear Him. ¹² As far as the east is from the west, So far has He removed our transgressions from us. ¹³ Just as a father has compassion on his children, So the Lord has compassion on those who fear Him. ¹⁴ For He Himself knows our frame; He is mindful that we are but dust.

Your eyes are too pure to approve evil, And You cannot look on wickedness with favor.

Genesis 6-8	Seen in Christ
The Ark - Salvation	Just as Noah and his family were saved from judgment by entering the ark, believers are saved from death by being "in Christ."
The Door to the Ark	The Ark had only one door, symbolizing there is only one way to salvation. John 10:9 "I am the door; if anyone enters through Me, he will be saved"

Genesis 6-8	Seen in Christ
God Initiates the Plan	God gave Noah the plan and sealed the door Himself, showing that salvation is initiated and completed by God, not human effort. (Ephesians 2:8-9)
Judgment of Sin	The flood represents God's righteous judgment against a corrupt world, paralleling the final judgment that Christ will execute. (Revelation 20)

Genesis 6-8	Seen in Christ
New Creation	After the flood, the earth is renewed, and Noah becomes a kind of new "Adam." Christ brings a new creation with His resurrection (2 Corinthians 5:17)
